

Indonesia as a Cocoa Producer

- Cocoa is Indonesia's fourth largest Agriculture export after palm oil, rubber, and coconut.
- Globally Indonesia is the third largest Cocoa producers after Ivory Coast and Ghana
- The cocoa smallholder contributed to 87%, state plantation contributed 8%, and large private plantation contributed 5% of national production
- The smallholders own relatively small areas of cacao farm which is around 1 Hectare each farmer


Problems of Conventional Cocoa Supply Chains



Problems of Conventional Cocoa Supply Chains

- Majority of export is in form of raw cocoa bean
- Supply chains are dominated by cash and carry, smallholder farmers sell their harvest at the farm gate
- Lost of revenue opportunities due to exporting raw beans
- Smallholders farmers do not benefit from the supply chains system: poor, low cash, and low quality of life



Smallholder Farmers as Respondents

- Survey was conducted to 130 coffee smallholders in two district in South Sulawesi Province
- The respondents are member of smallholders' cooperative
- Survey was conducted through Focus Group Discussion and Questionnaire
- The respondents have been part of the program since 2014



Perception towards Sustainable Value Chains Initiatives

- Economical Sustainability:
 - No significant income improvement, since the cocoa bean price still based on global market price
 - Still sell the bean at farm gate to middle men, need quick cash
 - Expensive to transport the bean to the collection point
- Social Sustainability
 - Benefit the most: gender inclusiveness, nutrition, and smallholders organization
- Environment Sustainability
 - Shifting to non chemical agricultural practice requires more resources and take more time
 - Needs to harvest fast because the needs of cash

How to make sustainable value chains benefit the smallholders?



Recommendation on the System

- Economics Sustainability
 - Set bean price not based on Global Market
 - Determine different price of cocoa beans sourced from sustainable plantation
 - Provide collection pick up facilities
 - Support complementary/alternative income source
- Social Sustainability
 - Strengthen the smallholders cooperatives to improve bargaining position
- Environmental Sustainability
 - Support complementary/alternative income source
 - Price incentive for non-chemical/environmentally friendly crops planting

Roles of Smallholders' Farmer Cooperatives



Roles of Smallholder Farmers Cooperatives

- Sharing knowledge and information
- Provides manpower assistants during planting and harvesting
- Collect bargaining power towards buyer or middle men
- Social support system in general
